Dear Friends

Red for Remembering.

I am writing this on a dull morning. Next week, Chris and I are on holiday, to catch some sun and warmth before the busyness of November, Advent and Christmas begins. One thing I always notice when we get home after an Autumn holiday is how dark the nights are. Dark nights remind me of "the dark night of the soul", a poem written by the 16th century Spanish Mystic poet, St John of the Cross. "Dark nights" also symbolise depression and loss.



This year I have introduced the liturgical colours to Richard Wakefield school as a way of explaining the story of Jesus - the colours match the theme words, aiding memory.

Purple in Advent and Lent, times of Preparing and Penitence.

Gold or white are bright celebration colours of Christmas and Easter seasons.

Green is for the long Trinity season, when we grow in our faith, putting into practice the teaching learnt in Advent, or Lent and on the reality of Christmas and Easter.

Red is mostly in November and for Saints' days. We remember.

On Sunday 5th November 6.30pm in Rolleston Church we are holding our annual Benefice "In Memorial" service. We invite those for whom Revd Dave or I have led a funeral service for their loved one in the past 2 years. Recently bereaved or in the past, you are invited to this quiet service with hymns, a Bible reading and an opportunity to light a candle and remember. Do we ever recover from the loss of someone we loved?

On Saturday 11 November, Armistice Day, there are short services in Rolleston and Anslow. Sunday 12 November is Remembrance Sunday with our parades and service across our Benefice. We remember and honour the sacrifices made by past and present armed force personnel, fighting and serving for the freedom of people from tyranny and oppression, and maintaining peace in changing regimes.

Red is also the colour of Pentecost when we celebrate and remember the Holy Spirit, arriving as a rushing wind and with tongues of fire, the presence, peace and power of God living within those who accept Jesus as their Lord and Saviour, the Holy Spirit, the "essence" of Jesus, promising to be with us always, to the end of the age" in whatever is going on in our lives, families, communities, nation and world. (Matt 28:20).

We remember when we worship God in Morning and Evening Prayer, and sharing Holy Communion, together. We remember that Jesus is with us, and that includes in our "dark nights of the soul", emotionally and physically. At the end of our services, we say, "Go in peace to love and serve the Lord, in the name of Christ. Amen". We remember Jesus. Yours, as we remember together,

***W4A** = Worship for All. A service particularly suitable for children to attend. It is in the context of Communion in Tutbury, and Morning Prayer in Rolleston and Anslow.

There is usually an activity pack (a wordsearch, crossword, a colouring sheet, a craft and sweets or chocolate related to the service theme) to take home.

**** 5th Sundays** - On 5th Sundays for the moment, we will continue to have a Benefice Communion service at 10am. We will rotate around our 3 churches / 4 congregations. However, we have noticed that fewer people attend in total on a 5th Sundays than would attend on "normal" Sundays in our 4 different services and congregations. It appears that many people do not want to worship in a building that is not their own.

The next 5th Sunday is **31st December, New Year's Eve.**

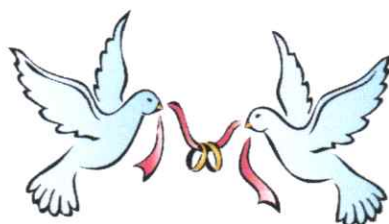

Thinking Aloud

Dear Friends,

Life in the Church

In our Bible readings on Sundays, we are continuing in Matthew's gospel. We are now in the 4th section of Jesus teaching, which is about life in Church as Jesus' followers. Jesus taught how to deal with conflict – "speak to the person who has wronged you on your own. If they hear what you are saying, you have gained a friend. If they do not listen, then bring 1 or 2 others as witnesses. If they still do not listen, bring the matter to the wider church". (Matthew 18:15-17).



On one later occasion, Peter asks Jesus, "How many times should we forgive? Is 7 times enough?" "No seventy times 7," is Jesus' teasing reply. Forgiveness does not mean denying the wrong happened, but rather deciding to forgive rather than seeking revenge. What Jesus really means regarding forgiveness, "don't think about it – just do it".

A true story...

Corrie Ten Boom lived in Holland during the Nazi occupation. Her family were Christians. They secretly housed Jews to protect them. She and her family were later betrayed and arrested. Corrie and her sister Betsie were sent to Ravensbruck concentration camp separate from the other family members. Their father died just 10 days after he was captured. Sadly, Corrie's sister Betsie died at Ravensbruck, Corrie was the only family survivor. She wrote up her story in a book called the Hiding place, a testimony to God's grace and protection. She became an international Christian speaker. One Sunday evening in 1947, she was speaking in a church in Munich, Germany. these are her words....

"It was in the church in Munich that I saw him -- a balding, heavy-set man in a grey overcoat, a brown felt hat clutched between his hands. People were filing out of the basement room where I had just spoken, moving along the rows of wooden chairs to the door at the rear.

There were never questions after a talk in Germany in 1947. People stood up in silence. In silence they collected their wraps. In silence left the room.

And that's when I saw him, working his way forward against the others.

One moment I saw the overcoat and the brown hat:

the next, a blue uniform and a visored cap with its skull and crossbones.

It came back to me with a rush: the huge room with its harsh overhead lights; the pathetic pile of dresses and shoes in the centre of the floor; the shame of walking naked past this man.

I could see my sister's frail form ahead of me, ribs sharp beneath the parchment skin. Betsie, how thin you were! The place was Ravensbruck and the man who was making his way forward towards me had been a guard - one of the cruellest guards.

Now he was in front of me, hand thrust out: "A fine message, Fraulein!

I fumbled with my pocketbook rather than take that hand. He would not remember me, of course - how could he remember one prisoner among those thousands of women? But I remembered him and the leather crop swinging from his belt. I was face-to-face with one of my captors and my blood seemed to freeze.

"You mentioned Ravensbruck in your talk," he was saying. "I was a guard there." No, he did not remember me. "I know that God has forgiven me for the cruel things I did there, but I would like to hear it from your lips as well. Fraulein," Again the hand came out, "will you forgive me?"

And I stood there - and I could not forgive. Betsie had died in that place - could he erase her slow terrible death simply for the asking? It could not have been many seconds that he stood there - hand held out - but to me it seemed hours as I wrestled with the most difficult thing I had ever had to do. For I had to do it - I know that.

But still I stood there with the coldness clutching my heart. "Jesus, help me!" I prayed silently. "I can lift my hand. I can do that much. You supply the feeling." And so woodenly, mechanically, I thrust my hand into the one stretched out to me. And as I did, an incredible thing took place. The current started in my shoulder, raced down my arm, sprang into our joined hands. And then this healing warmth seemed to flood my whole being, bringing tears to my eyes.

"I forgive you, brother!" I cried. "With all my heart." For a long moment we grasped each other's hands, the former guard and the former prisoner. I had never known God's love so intensely as I did then. But even so, I realized it was not my love. I had tried and did not have the power.

It was the power of the Holy Spirit as recorded in Romans 5:5, "because the love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Spirit which is given unto us."

Heating System Update

Dateline 12 October - We have received today, the formal approval (Faculty) from the Diocese to go ahead and replace the heating boiler and the defective heating pipes in ducts under the North side of the aisle.

Our appointed Heating Contractor, Harnce Heating and Plumbing Ltd, is due to carry out the work around the first week in November. For the pipework in the main church in particular, there will inevitably be some disruption whilst the work proceeds including moving of the pews along the North side of the Aisle as well as limited access to the Vestry, Priory Suite and the Choir stalls on that side. We will be keeping you posted when and where.



Tutbury WI

The service was withdrawn at the beginning of the 1960s. A lot of work has been done at the Rolleston site with pathways down and a wild meadow has been grown.

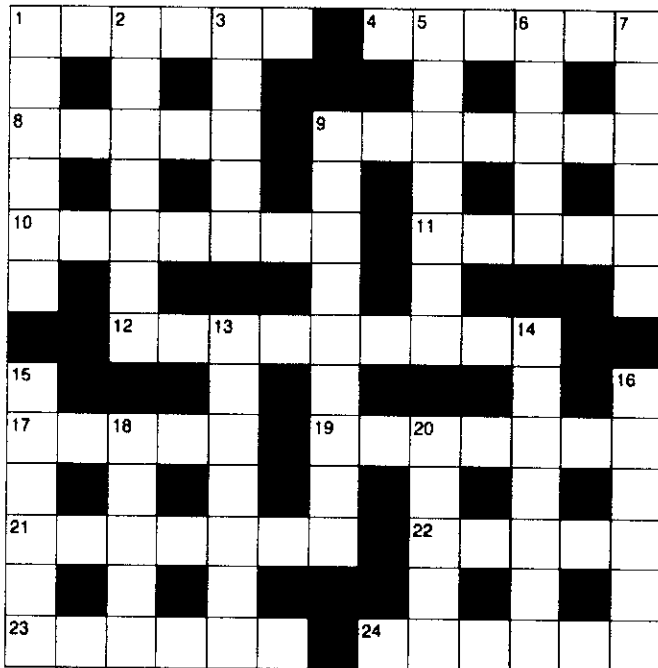
Gift Aid

Benefice Recipes

On requesting other styles of article for our Benefice magazine, a favourite recipe page was suggested as something fun to share.

To date, we have had recipes for a Rocky Road tray bake, a Lemon Drizzle cake. great Flapjacks. and Stilton Biscuits

We now have a Gluten-Free sponge cake from Margaret Pyle, Church warden in Tutbury. It is often on sale at Priory Pantry in Tutbury Church (Saturdays from 10am to 12 noon)

Gluten-Free Victoria Sandwich Cake

Ingredients

225g/8oz caster sugar
4 free-range eggs
1 tsp vanilla extract
225g/8oz butter, cubed and well-softened, plus extra for greasing
250g/9oz gluten-free white self-raising flour
1 tsp gluten-free baking powder
1tp Xantham Gum (See note*)
125g/4½oz jam (raspberry, strawberry and blackcurrant all work well)
1 tbsp icing sugar, sifted



Method

Preheat the oven to 190C/170C Fan/Gas 5.

Butter two 20cm/8in loose-based sandwich tins and line the bases with circles of baking paper./



/.... Beat the sugar, eggs and vanilla until very pale, smooth and thick. the whisk should leave a thin trail of batter when lifted from the bowl

Add the butter, flour and baking powder and beat together for 1–2 minutes more until smooth.

Divide the mixture evenly between the prepared tins and smooth the surface. Bake on the same shelf in the centre of the oven for 20–22 minutes, or until well-risen, golden-brown and just beginning to shrink back from the sides of the tin.

Remove the tins from the oven and turn out on to a wire rack after 15mins. Peel off the baking paper and leave to cool completely.

Place one of the sponges on a plate or cake stand. Spoon jam onto the cake. Spread almost all the way to the edges. Sandwich the cakes together and dust with sifted icing sugar.

**Whilst not essential, Margaret uses Xantham Gum to make the cake more cohesive (less crumbly).*
