Welcome to the May 2024 Edition of the Magazine for the Churches of Anslow, Rolleston-on-Dove and Tutbury.

Reverend Phyllis, we wish you well and hope you recover soon from your sickness. Meanwhile, David Bousie has stepped into the breach to provide pastoral thoughts this month in the following letter. (Phil Norris - Editor)

Dear Friends

Hope refuses to die. I am writing this pastoral letter whilst recovering from a stroke. Lying on my hospital bed I wondered what the future would hold for one who had been so active and involved in church life. I thank God I am slowly getting better.

My thoughts were drawn to the prophet Ezekiel and chapter 37 "The Valley of the Dry Bones," a reading for Pentecost. Israel had been chosen by God to let the nations around know of his saving love. But Israel chose to go its own way and follow other gods. So they were taken into exile and their beautiful temple destroyed.

At this point what did the future hold for the nation? They were like these dry bones that Ezekiel saw. Nevertheless, God in his love and mercy promised to restore them. Ezekiel prophesied to the bones and they came together, then they were covered by skin, given organs and finally were filled with the Spirit and full of life once more.

The theme is picked up in the New Testament readings for Ascension and Pentecost. The followers of Jesus had pinned their hopes on him: "We had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel" (Luke 24/21): hope for them seemed to have been lost when he was crucified. But God had other plans.

The restoration began with the glorious resurrection of Jesus but this was not the full story. The disciples thought it was and "jumped the gun" by asking Jesus just before he ascended into heaven: "Lord will you restore the kingdom to Israel?" (Acts 1/6) The kingdom was to be restored but not to the Israel as the disciples knew it, but to a new Israel encompassing the whole world of those who accept Jesus as Saviour.

Finally on the Day of Pentecost the Holy Spirit came and filled the disciples with new life. (Acts 2) Astonishingly, it was Peter, the one who had disowned his Lord, who proclaimed the gospel message to Jews from around the Roman Empire. Like a stone thrown in a pool the ripple effect of the Good News of Jesus spreads out and we who are Christians are part of that movement.

May the gifts of the Spirit fill our lives so that those around us may see how we care and love each other and be drawn to Jesus. We can take an active part in growing the kingdom by praying for those who do not know Jesus as part of "Thy kingdom Come. Light the World from the 9th to the 19th May. May the Lord bless us and keep us.

* **W4A = Worship for All.** A service particularly suitable for children to attend. It is in the context of Communion in Tutbury, and Service of the Word in Rolleston and Anslow. There is usually an activity pack (a wordsearch, crossword, a colouring sheet, a craft related to the service theme) to take home or do in church after the service.

** **When there is a 5th Sunday of a Month** - On 5th Sundays, it is normally our custom to have a combined Benefice service and we rotate the venue around our three Churches. Be assured that we are planning to have a separate service of Holy Communion in each of our congregations on Easter Sunday (5th Sunday of the Month). The 5th Sunday after that is **30 June** which is also Tutbury Open Gardens weekend. We are invited to worship as a Benefice together in Tutbury Church at 10am

The 8am BCP said Holy communion in Rolleston will also recommence after the Winter break on Easter Sunday.

Midweek Communion - Rolleston Thursdays at 9.30am - Common Worship Holy Communion.

This is followed by Coffee Club, 10am to 11.30am in the OGSR.

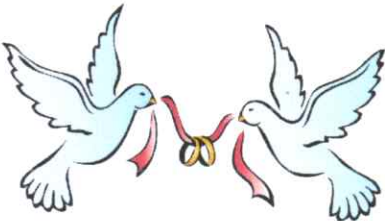

St. Mary's choir sang "All in the April Evening" and "Morte Christe."

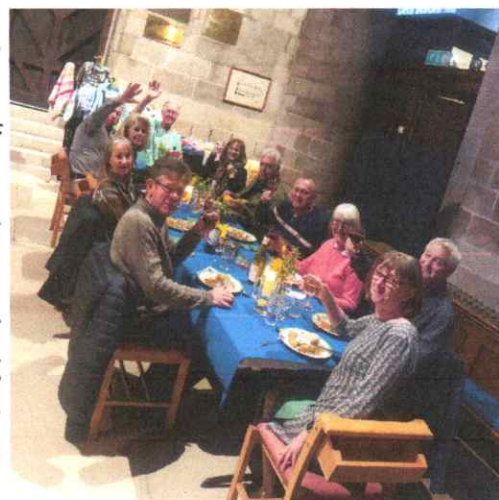
Roger ended his recital by playing "Sortie 3 in E flat" by Louis Lefebure - Wely.

Benefice Recipe

To date, we have had recipes for a Rocky Road, a lemon Drizzle cake, flapjacks, stilton biscuits, GF Victoria Sponge, Tartiflette and Popcorn Peanut "Snickers"

Our Benefice Recipe contribution this month is:-

Easy Pecan Blondies

These Blondies , made with white chocolate, make lovely accompaniment with your morning coffee...

Recipe

175g white chocolate
chopped or broken up
115g unsalted butter, diced
100g caster sugar
2 medium eggs
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
124g plain flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
150g pecan halves
8 inch shallow cake tin, greased and base-lined

Method

1. Heat oven to 180 deg C and put chocolate and butter into a large .../

/.... heatproof bowl which is set over a pan of hot water. Melt gently, stirring frequently. As soon as the chocolate is nearly all melted, remove the bowl from pan and stir until mixture is smooth.

2. Stir in sugar and leave to cool for 2 minutes or until barely warm.

3. Put the eggs and vanilla into a small bowl and beat with a fork until frothy. Add chocolate mixture and stir to a glossy consistency. Sift flour and baking powder and 100g pecan halves and stir into bowl.

4. Transfer into the prepared tin and spread evenly. Scatter remaining pecans on top. Bake for 20-25mins.

5. Once cold, turn out and cut into squares. Store in air-tight tin and eat within 4 days.



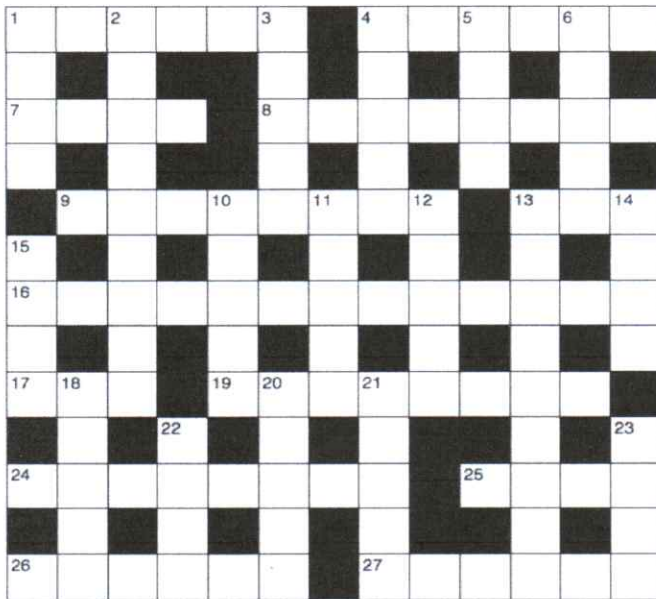

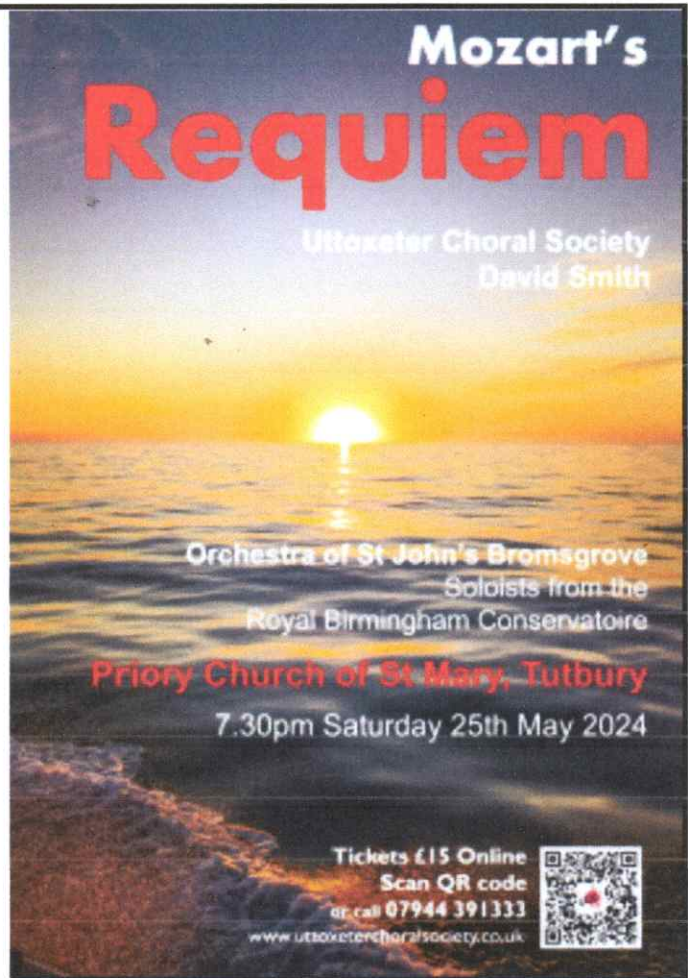


Uttoxeter Choral Society
