

Editor: For this edition with the continuing vacancy, Our retired minister who lives in the Benefice, Rev'd Dave has kindly provided the pastoral letter - Thank you Dave for all you do for us:

Dear Friends,

Here we are in November with another year fast coming to a close. It has been quite a year, hasn't it, with most of the world engaged either in warfare, natural disasters or selfish pursuits.

As I write this our hopes are being raised by the Peace Agreement between Israel and Hamas, which embraces much of that region also. From an inhumane attack on the people of Israel, we have seen much death and destruction. Mr Putin continues his relentless attack on the people of the Ukraine for no other reason that wanting their land. Here in our country, we are currently in the midst of a crisis caused by illegal immigrants which has divided opinions up and down our nation.

At the beginning of November, we remember the division this country went through in the 16th and 17th centuries. A time when our monarchy went from being Roman Catholic to Protestant causing great upheaval and sowing the seeds of the plan to blow up the King and the house of Lords in one act, The Gunpowder Plot.

Then on the 11th of November we remember those who gave their lives in the wars that have been since 1914. We will stand in silence after saying, "We will remember them." #### **News and Views**

Archbishop Sarah Mullally, has warned peers in the House of Lords that legalising assisted suicide in England and Wales will "change society" by endorsing the idea that "some lives are not worth living".

Archbishop Sarah Mullally, recently appointed Archbishop of Cantabury, ex Bishop of London & the former Chief Nursing Officer for England, was concerned about those who could face internal and subtle pressures to end their lives if assisted suicide were introduced – particularly in the absence of adequate palliative or social care, or out of fear of becoming a burden on their families.

"I understand the fear of many that they may be offered free assisted death before they are offered the care and equipment that they may live," she said.

As the Church of England's lead bishop for health and social care, the Bishop of London was speaking as the House of Lords debated the Terminally III Adults (End of Life) Bill in late September.

The Private Member's Bill, brought by the MP Kim Leadbeater, completed its Third Reading in the Commons in June with a reduced majority of just 23 votes amid mounting concerns about its safety.

"I am deeply concerned that so many in this Parliament are not heeding the voices of professional and representative bodies that are raising the alarm."

She also rejected the central claim that the Bill would offer people choice at the end of their lives.

"A meaningful choice would see the measures in this Bill set alongside equally available, fully funded palliative and social care services," she said. "Without the choice offered this choice is an illusion.",

"To change the law is to change society," she added. "If passed, this Bill will signal that we are a society that believes that some lives are not worth living.

"This Bill would become our State-endorsed position, and our NHS would be active in its delivery."

"I believe in a God who's very being is life, and in that gift we can discover meaning, dignity and innate worth, even if we are dying.

Nonetheless, the assisted dying bill has passed its second reading in the House of Lords, moving it another step closer to becoming law. The Bill now goes to a select committee for further scrutiny, with a deadline of reporting back to the House of Lords by 7th November, before it can move to the next stage.

The gentleman replied, "Oh, I haven't told my family yet. I just sit around and listen to the conversations. I've changed my will three times!"


#### Where there's smoke...

#### **Benefice Recipe**

Editor: This month, I put forward another simple but very tasty variation on a Cheese tart. Great as a snack or a light lunch with salad. It serves four.

RECIPE

#### Leek, Ham and Brie Slice

#### Recipe

A large knob of butter
3 leeks, sliced
Salt and pepper
375g (13oz) ready-rolled
puff pastry
175g (6oż) piece of ham cut
into cubes
\*300-350g (10—12oz) Brie,
cut into wedges
1 egg yolk
A splash of Milk
Olive Oil for Drizzling



Melt the butter in a large saucepan and once sizzling, add the leeks and cook over a medium heat, without colouring, until they start to soften. Season with salt and pepper, then drain and leave to cool. ..../

/.... Preheat the oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas 6. Lightly brush a baking tray with oil, unroll the puff pastry and place on top. Using a fork, prick the base several times leaving a clear 2cm (3/4") border around the outside.

Add the ham to the leeks and spoon onto the pastry. Arrange the Brie wedges across the surface. Brush the



pastry border with egg yolk mixed with the milk.

Bake in the oven for 20 - 25 minutes until the pastry is golden brown. Leave to cool slightly before drizzling with a little oil. Cut into slices to serve.

There are many soft-rind cheeses that can be used in place of Brie. Try a Camembert. If you are visiting a specialist cheese shop or Deli, you can try a Coulommiers, a Sharpam from Devon, or an Irish Cooleney.




