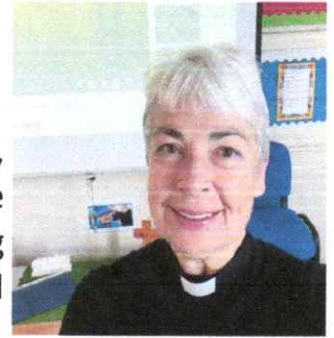

Dear Friends

We reap what we sow

An event is anticipated in the Rectory garden - Chris and I are waiting, with bated breath, for the flowering of our giant sunflower. We sowed the seed, fed the ground, weeded around the developing plant, watched it grow taller and taller, and any day now it should bloom.



We are about to begin Harvest Festival season when we traditionally meet together to give thanks that the Harvest is safely gathered in. But it is so much more than that; we can also give thanks for all the good things in our lives: the food on our plates, but also the roof over our head, the love of our family, and friends and the fullness of life we enjoy.

The idea behind the “Law of Attraction” is that the more we complain about things, the more things we will find to complain about. The more we are thankful, the more things we will find to be thankful for! I believe there is some truth in this. In the Bible we are told that “we reap what we sow” (Galatians 6:7) and to “give thanks in all circumstances” (1 Thessalonians 5:18) and this is God’s will for us.

May this Harvest season be a time of thanksgiving: a time when we reap what we have sown, to God’s praise and glory.

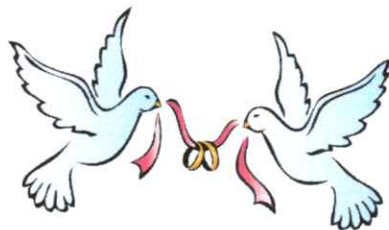

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Life in the Church

After our summer series of Heroes of faith: the Exile and prophets, we are now back in the Lectionary, the set Bible readings for each Sunday. We are continuing in Matthew's gospel. We are now in the 4th section of Jesus teaching, which is about life in Church as Jesus' followers. Jesus taught how to deal with conflict – speak to the person who has wronged you on your own. If they hear what you are saying, then you have gained a friend. If they do not listen, then bring 1 or 2 others as witnesses. If they still do not listen, you bring the matter to the wider church.

The Bible reading for 17 September, is Matthew 18 when Peter asks Jesus, "How many times should we forgive? Is 7 times enough?" Peter asks. "No seventy times 7," is Jesus' teasing reply. Forgiveness does not mean denying the wrong happened, but rather deciding to forgive rather than seeking revenge. What Jesus really means regarding forgiveness, "don't think about it – just do it".

Notes For Parents wishing to have a Baptism in our Benefice

The Baptism Certificate states:

This child has begun life as a Christian.

It is the duty of Parents and Godparents to see that their child goes on according to this beginning and is:

- Trained to pray and taught the Christian life.
- Trained in Christian habits as soon as possible.
- Encouraged to attend church by personal example.
- Helped to be brought to confirmation.

Local Policy

If parents and godparents tell us that they can honestly say these vows, then we baptise their child. The matter is then between them and God.

Many parents are now saying that they are not ready to say the baptismal vows or commit to regular church attendance and are choosing a **Thanksgiving Service** which can include anointing with oil.

Please note church attendance for 3 months if not required before you can have a baptism. But why would you want to have your child baptised if you were not a regular member of a church?

Phyllis' practice is to invite **parents and godparents** to attend an **Information Evening** or to visit the family at home **before** a date of service is agreed. This is the chance for families to read through the serious vows of commitment that will be said by parents and godparents. It also gives space to ask questions about faith.

If families do not live in an ART Benefice parish, they also need to contact their local vicar / priest and ask their goodwill for this pastoral service to take place in a different parish to their residence.

Three more pieces were played by Arthur's friend, John Evanson, who started his celebrated musical career on our Church's organ, taught by Rev'd Timothy Ganz.

The Church Choir along with Hanbury's Choir sang one of Arthur's own compositions "As we gather in our house." Organist Roger played out with three pieces. All the music had been specifically chosen by Arthur with Roger before his death.

Rev'd Dave read a final moving Eulogy which was penned by Arthur's friend Roger.

This memorial was undoubtedly a fitting memorial which will be long remembered by the family and his many friends who filled the Church.

Tutbury Remembers: Sgt Charles William Bull. 2pm Sunday 1st October

Sgt Charles Bull gave his life 79 years ago, defending the bridge over the River Scheldt at Gavere in Belgium. He is remembered by local people as a hero.

The short commemorative service to remember and honour him, will be attended, as in previous years, by members of the village of Gavere.

Who can be buried in a churchyard?

Tutbury PCC (Parish Church Council) resolution. 11 September 2023

At the above PCC meeting, the following was affirmed in line with the national Church of England Policy for Churchyards.

The following people have a right to be buried in the churchyard:

- Residents in the parish* at their time of death.
- Those whose names are on the Church electoral roll.
- Those dying in the parish.

The same rights apply to cremated remains as with normal burials.

**Note: This is defined as the person's last residential address having been IN the parish before they were admitted to hospital or moved into a nursing or care home.*

Those who do not qualify for the right to be buried in a new plot in Tutbury, may be buried in the existing grave of a one-step relation.

A one-step relation is a spouse, parent, child or sibling. The PCC will need written permission from other equal relations for this to happen.

For further information, please speak to the Incumbent or the Church wardens.

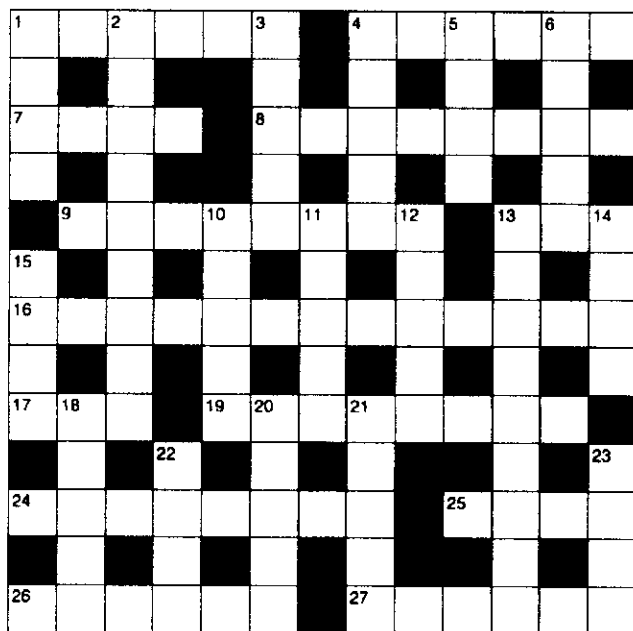

Benefice Recipes

This month, the recipe is from Elspeth Dickinson, from Rolleston Church

Stilton Biscuits

Recipe

100g/4oz plain flour
85g/3oz cold butter, diced
Small pinch mustard powder
Small pinch cayenne pepper
1 tbsp polenta (this is optional but adds extra crunch)
1 tbsp poppy seeds
100g/4oz stilton, crumbled (it's easier to use if taken straight from the fridge)



Method

Place all the ingredients in a food processor and whizz until it forms a dough. (alternatively place all the ingredients in a bowl and rub all the ingredients together to a dough)



On a lightly floured surface roll the dough into a sausage approximately 25cm long by 4cm in diameter, then wrap in cling film and chill for at least an hour. (The pastry can be chilled for up to a week or frozen for up to a month).

Pre heat the oven to 190C or 170C fan. Slice the dough into rounds just under 1cm thick. Place the rounds a couple of centimetres apart on a baking sheet.

Bake in the oven for 10-15mins, until the edges are starting to go golden.

The biscuits keep for 2-3 days in an airtight tin.
