

Welcome to the September 2025 Edition of the Magazine for the Churches of Anslow, Rolleston-on-Dove and Tutbury.

Editor: For this edition, I have used an article written in the Parish Pump website entitled:

Abiding in Jesus

It will soon be time of year for many churches to hold their Harvest Festival services. The farmers in the UK may well be harvesting early due to the vagaries of our weather in 2025. No doubt, there will be displays of food, some bought with others grown in gardens and allotments. While gardeners can have pleasure growing fruit and vegetables it can be hard work tending to them and dealing with pests.

Jesus knew about the care given to vines. In John 15:1-8 Jesus compared Himself to a vine and referred to God as the gardener. These verses are both challenging and reassuring. In this parable, God is responsible for pruning the vine. He sees what parts are useful and what parts are useless. The unproductive parts are cut away, so that growth is encouraged. Jesus is telling us that God will prune our lives, not to harm us, but to encourage our spiritual growth.

God's pruning cuts away wrong attitudes and wasteful behaviour, all of which serve no useful purpose in our lives. This pruning is required so that we become more fruitful. And the fruit God wants is love, joy, patience etc. (see Galatians 5:22-23) These holy qualities are intended to influence the world to change it from the bad to all that is good.

To encourage its growth, a vine has to be regularly cut back. The effect looks drastic, but essential. When God cuts away the dead wood in our lives He does it because He knows how our lives can grow. The pruning knives are in the hands of our Father God who only desires the best for us. This pruning process can be painful, but Jesus says that it is vital if the Holy Spirit is to flow through us to produce the fruit that God wants.

Also in this parable, Jesus said He was the vine, and we are the branches. We have no existence apart from Jesus. We can do nothing for God on our own and must be joined to Jesus. In the same way a vine utilises the life-giving sap to flow into the branches, so we need the Holy Spirit to flow His life into us. It is only by remaining in Jesus can He give us the inner resources for an effective fruit-producing life.

Jesus said 'Abide in Me' (John 15:4 King James Version). Abiding speaks of sustenance, being upheld and supported, enduring and withstanding. So, if we are to reap a harvest of holiness, may we be prepared for God's pruning, and continue to abide in Jesus, our Lord and Saviour.



News and Views

Editor: This article, entitled: "The Gaza Food System is like the Hunger Games" was written by The Most Reverend Hosam Naoum, Archbishop of Jerusalem....

The leader of the Anglican church in the Holy Land has urged Christians to "speak out in the face of injustices" – including the "horrifying" current arrangements for food aid in Gaza" – as he called for a permanent ceasefire to end the war.

The Most Revd Hosam Naoum, the Archbishop in Jerusalem, was addressing the General Synod in July. He said that at that time, hospitals were being bombed in Gaza, medical supplies were in short supply and that there was a 'horrifying' system of food distribution, comparable to the dystopian series The Hunger Games, with three sites open one hour a day for two million people.

Calling for a restoration of humanitarian supplies including food and medicine, under UN supervision, Archbishop Hosam said there should be no targeting of civilians, especially emergency workers and medical staff.

He called for the release of all hostages and captives and a permanent ceasefire for the end of the war and rebuilding of Gaza – "not ethnic cleansing that is presently being discussed by the Israeli and US Government."

The church is committed to peace building and reconciliation – a message that he has repeated "time and time again" – but these are "alien terms" that people across both sides of the divide refuse to talk about or even listen to, he said.

"I realise that as a church we live and embody the Gospel and we are not politicians.

"However, we need to speak out in the face of injustices and be prophetic for the sake of our people and our calling as Christians.

"But where a church is wounded and constrained, we need the wider body of Christ to help us to be the church in brutal and damaging times."

The Most Reverend Hosam Naoum is the 15th Anglican Bishop in Jerusalem, a role he has held since 2021. He was born in Haifa and grew up in Shefa'amr in Galilee.

The Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem is home to about 7,000 Anglicans worshipping within 28 different congregations. It is also responsible for more than 30 institutions, including hospitals, schools, clinics and rehabilitation centres. The Diocese is scattered across five separate countries or territories: Jordan, Palestine, Lebanon, Syria, and Israel.

The quick-thinking minister's wife answered, "Yes, dear, she went away over an hour ago. But such good news – Mrs Jones has come to call in the meantime!"


Using the English language...

INSPIRING WOMEN Our Speaker for the July meeting was Analiza Jones talking about Shell Craft from the Philippines. Analiza started by showing us on a world map where the Philippines were in relation to the UK.

She explained it was in Southeast Asia and surrounded by bodies of water. She told us it was prone to typhoons, which resulted in the islands being rich in Fauna and Flora as well as marine resources. She showed us pictures of the rubbish that blights our oceans and is the size of Belgium.

Analiza also stated that in some Pacific areas shells are used as currency. Analiza showed us rare shells that live deep in the sea and are difficult to harvest. The Philippines are famous for the Giant clam shells (which have pearls) that are used to make items such as planters, bowls (which are used in local churches to hold Holy water) and bird baths. Analiza informed us that the giant shells were poached by the Chinese to near extinction. Analiza showed us a clip from a recent Antiques roadshow where a Giant Caribbean Conch shell (which also have Pearls) were valued at £3,500. Analiza informed us that a Philippines clam shell was recently valued at £10,000.

Our Shell Competition winners were - 1st - Janet, 2nd - Joycelyn and 3rd - Shirley. There will be no meeting in August whilst our members enjoy a Prosecco and Pot Painting evening at Barton Marina. Our September meeting will be on the 11th and is entitled "How to love Poetry"

Benefice Recipe

Editor: This edition's recipe is one of my family's favourite meal in as a main course. It is simple to prepare and really tasty

Pork Stroganoff

Recipe

- A knob of butter
- 1 Onion, sliced
- 100g(4oz) button Mushrooms, sliced
- 300g (12oz) pork fillet, cut into thin strips
- Salt
- A pinch of cayenne pepper
- a pinch of paprika
- 2-3 tablespoons brandy
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 100-150ml (3½-5 fl oz) sour cream or Crème fraiche



An extra: 1 red pepper, cut into thin strips

Method

The pork fillet is the same tender, lean joint as beef fillet. Pork loin will also go well in this dish if fillet is not available

/.... Melt the knob of butter in a wok or large frying pan. Once sizzling, add the onion and mushroom and fry for a few minutes until softened.



Season the pork fillet strips with salt, cayenne pepper and paprika. Scatter the strips into the pan, increasing the heat and cooking for several minutes with the onion and mushroom.

Pour in and flambé the brandy in the pan. Stir in the Dijon mustard before pouring in the sour cream. Simmer for a minute and taste. Season with more salt, cayenne pepper and paprika to taste (if needed).

Something extra: Put the thin red pepper strips at the same time as the onion and mushrooms.

To Serve:



We do not hold auditions, you do not have to be able to read music, but if you love to sing and want to join like-minded people, then come and join us.


Unsure if you are a soprano, alto, tenor or bass? Not even sure what that means. No problem; just come and see which part suits you best.
